

We currently have three projects happening in our communities which involve our local school districts (Bedford Area, Chestnut Ridge, Claysburg Kimmel, Everett Area, Greater Johnstown, Northern Bedford, and Tussey Mountain), a local business (Live Well Chiropractic), and a local agency (Cambria County Backpack Project): the accepting of applications for Teacher Enrichment Grants, the collection of food items for local Weekend Backpack Programs, and the preparation of We Care Bags for families dealing with a devastating personal situation (loss of possessions due to any unfortunate event, sudden change in living conditions, etc.). All of these projects offer us the opportunity to strengthen our bonds in the community while increasing our visibility.

October 1948

October 1948 was a busy month for the members of Alpha Beta. President Rosalind Mowry and Corresponding Secretary Irma Diehl attended a regional meeting at Wellsboro. In their report at the October 20 Chapter Meeting, they stated that they found the meeting to be "educational and enjoyable".

The second regular meeting of the chapter was held on October 20 at the New Hoffman Hotel in Bedford. The members of Alpha Delta, the Somerset chapter, were their guests at this dinner meeting. Two members of Iota Chapter were also in attendance.

Ethel McCormack, Iota Chapter, was the guest speaker. She spoke concerning various aspects of Delta Kappa Gamma, including the seven purposes of the society and procedures for balloting and for dropping members. She also spoke concerning the teacher's place in the social and political life of the community.

Clara Cockerille, Iota Chapter, was the Director of Altoona Public Schools. She also spoke to the chapter concerning new legislation concerning the present retirement system.

Opportunities Abound

Ladies it is with great pleasure I share some opportunities with you that could enhance your life, teaching career and your classroom. Not many organizations have funds set aside to help you learn and develop new skills, get credits towards furthering your degree or help with buying supplies to develop and introduce a new and innovative concept in your classroom. Well, Pennsylvania State Organization and Delta Kappa Gamma do have such scholarship and grant opportunities and the first step begins with you! I am going to briefly tell you about these opportunities and then you can go onto https:// dkgpa.weebly.com and find the applications to apply. In most cases you will need reference letters or signatures from Becky to finish your applications so don't wait until the last minute to apply. Becky and I are available if you need any help filling out the applications or have questions about the scholarships, Nancy Grove Grant and enrichment grant opportunities. The second step is to follow each and every detail on the application in order to be considered for these opportunities. Third, be mindful of the application deadlines and get your application in on a timely manner.

The first opportunity that I would like to share is that there are scholarship grants available for our sisters that are pursuing continuing education credits. \$15,000 is set aside each year for scholarships and the committee distributes the funds based on the needs and qualifications of the applicants. The scholarship recipients if they receive a scholarship must use the award in the fiscal year following the state convention in which it was received. Scholarship applications are due by: February 1, 2024.

The second opportunity is the Marian Spitzer Robling Scholarship. This scholarship is specifically for members who are in their first three years of DKG membership. The scholarship helps fund continuing education credits that you are working on towards a degree. The application deadline is: February 1, 2024.

The third opportunity is an enrichment grant. An enrichment grant is an opportunity to apply for a grant to use for a personal development activity, experience or learning opportunity that addresses one of the seven purposes of DKG. The funds must be used in the fiscal year following state convention. The recipient also is required to write an article for the state newsletter following completion of their experience. Deadline to apply for an enrichment grant is: February 1, 2024.

The fourth opportunity is near and dear to my heart because I have had the pleasure of receiving this award. The award is called the Nancy Grove Visionary Award. It is an award funded by the past presidents of Pennsylvania State. It is an award of \$500.00 for an in-service active teacher to use to fund an innovative ideas and activities related to Excellence in Education within the educational community. It is imperative that the person who receives this award attends state convention to receive their award. The award must be used within the fiscal year following state convention. The deadline to apply is: February 1, 2024

CORNETET APPLICATIONS FOR ACTIVE TEACHERS DUE NOVEMBER 1

The Lucile Cornetet Award for Professional Development is an award granted to educators to participate in professional seminars, workshops, lecture series, on-line courses, and other non-degree program opportunities that relate specifically to an applicant's professional aspirations and/or current educational assignment. CHANGES TO UNICEF'S SCHOOL FOR AFRICA'S PROGRAM

Beginning in January 2023, UNICEF shifted its focus on advancing education in Sub-Saharan Africa by creating systematic, sustainable change in the education pathway for children from early learning to primary and onwards to secondary education and by targeting vulnerable groups including adolescent girls and children with disabilities so that no child is left behind. This focus shift saw UNICEF "sunset" the Schools for Africa program at the end of December 2022.

New programs include:

- A Global Education Fund (may include pilot projects for new innovations, system strengthening activities, or proven tactics such as teacher training, curriculum reform, etc. around the world and not specific only to Africa).
- Education in Africa (continue to build on the success of Schools for Africa; ensure that all children, including the most remote and marginalized, are learning and gaining skills for succeeding in life and work; most equivalent to Schools for Africa).
- Girls Girls Initiative to Revitalize Learning and Success Fund (direct funds to African countries where girls' education is a challenge; prioritize efforts to enable all girls to complete secondary education and develop knowledge and skills for life and work.

The International EEC Committee will review this new programming and make a recommendation on DKG's focus. (As of this time, since we send our funds directly to the Jabulani School, we are not affected by UNICEF's changes.)

PROJECTS NEWS

Thank you to everyone who donated school supplies at the August meeting! We filled 31 book bags with a variety of supplies. They were given to the students who benefit from the assistance of the Bedford County Children & Youth Services. Because of our members generosity, we were able to give each school district some school supplies. They were distributed to students who could benefit from them.

At the August meeting, the rainy day bags and coin wrappers were made available to take home. At the October meeting, please return them or bring your donation to continue our assistance to the Jabulani School in Zimbabwe, Africa. Our contact person, Harrison shared with Linda McElroy that the recent presidential

election kept in power a man who is not a supporter of education. So, our support from Alpha Beta will be greatly appreciated to provide assistance with school supplies and meals!

For the past few meetings, members have been donating personal care items and more fleece blankets have been completed. A work session to "assemble" the book bags and bag the fleece blankets is scheduled for Monday, September 18th for our "busy" retired members. It has been our goal to deliver the "We Care" Project items early in the 2023-2024 school year. This work session will help us to reach that goal!

US FORUM

House of Representatives (H.R.) 5 also known at the Parents' Bill of Rights Act is legislation to watch. It was passed in the House on March 23, 2023 and was sent to the Senate, where it has been referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions. This bill establishes various rights of parents and guardians regarding the public elementary or secondary school education of their children.

These rights include the right to:

- review (and make copies of at no cost) the curriculum of their child's school
- know if the state alters its challenging academic standards
- meet with each teacher of their child at least twice each school year
- review the budget, including all revenues and expenditures, of their child's school
- receive information about violent activity in their child's school
- know if their child is not grade-level proficient in reading or language arts at the end of third grade

2024 INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

The 2024 DKG International Convention comes to National Harbor, Maryland, from July 9-13, 2024 at the Gaylord National Resort & Convention Center. Like those before it, the 2024 International Convention promises to deliver enlightening breakout sessions, the chance to network with fellow members from around the world, and the opportunity to shape the future of DKG as members gather to vote on proposed amendments to the Society's governing documents.

Two incredible keynote speakers are already lined up, Margot Lee Shetterly and Andre Bradford. Margot is the author of Hidden Figures: The American Dream and the Untold Story of the Black Women Mathematicians Who Helped Win the Space Race, which was a top book of 2016 for both TIME and Publisher's Weekly, a USA Today bestseller, and a #1 (instant) New York Times bestseller. The film adaptation of Shetterly's book became the number one movie in America upon its release in 2016. It was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Picture and Best Adapted Screenplay, and star Octavia Spencer was nominated for Best Supporting Actress.

Andre Bradford, a.k.a. S.C. Says, is an Austin based slam poet who has been performing slam poetry since 2013. He has toured and been featured at venues and universities across the country, and his work has been featured in the Huffington Post, Write About Now, The Edge radio, The Culture Trip, and Blavity. He is a two-time Austin Poetry Slam Champion, the 2022 Texas Grand Slam Champion, and author of the poetry collection Golden Brown Skin. Bradford's poetry covers a gamut of topics ranging from being mixed race, to social justice, to mental health awareness, to never settling in relationships.
