KEY WOMEN EDUCATORS HONORED AT MAY MEETING

Nikki Gephart started her teaching career in 2011 at Chestnut Ridge. She was the alternative education teacher, cheer advisor and their after school coordinator.

In 2014, she was hired by Tussey Mountain mainly as a Math 8 teacher/grade 8 STEM teacher and she has also taught Algebra 1. She was part of the school's Data Analysis team for a few years. In this position she dug into data and showed fellow teachers how to use that data to inform their instruction. She continues to track 8th grade math data.

Nikki was a mentor teacher for a new math colleague last year. This past year she had a pre-student teacher from UPJ who did zoom lessons with the students in Nikki's classes.

After a full day of teaching, Nikki is not done! She stays most nights until 6 pm where she continues in her role as grade 6-12 After School Coordinator at Tussey. She leads her staff and students in tutoring sessions and many fun activities.

Kathy Miller is a retired elementary art educator from the Northern Bedford Area School District who had a knack for making her students feel special and for touching the lives of her students in small yet truly meaningful ways. Her passion for art excited her students about art. Yvonne Bowser can testify that Kathy is a great teacher and person because she is one of Kathy's former students.

Kathy also inspired and motivated her colleagues with her work on Visiting Author Projects, the annual elementary art show, making and screen printing sweatshirts for a sixth grade field trip to Baltimore to meet the Captain of the Mimi (which was an educational TV show), and through coordinating props for the second



RAINY DAY FUND – JABULANI SCHOOL

After our May meeting, I wired \$300 collected from our chapter to Harrison for the Jabulani School. I had asked how the situation was doing for the school. He explained that there was no harvest last year - on top of the Covid problems - so the Zimbabwe government had asked schools to help provide 2 meals every day for children. By the way, they are entering their winter season. Harrison included two pictures taken at the school. He also included the following letter to Jim and me. **- Linda McElroy**

Hi Jim & Linda,

I have just collected and handed over the money for Jabulani. Sefiwe said please keep up your good gesture to them and be blessed ! $\bigcirc \bigcirc$.

Sefiwe said that there is hunger in the village because there was not any harvests the last season and so the government has asked schools to provide the school children two meals a day. The government provides part of the meals then the school provides the rest. The school must look for food needed to make a full meal for the kids and so the donations will go towards feeding these kids! Parents in the village take turns to cook at the school or sometimes they can request from the Magistrates Courts for the inmates that would have been charged to do community services to come and





do the cooking because the school can not afford to hire someone to do the job. They provide porridge in the morning at around 9am then at around 1pm they provide lunch (Sadza and beans) Sadza is an African staple diet food, which is like a thick porridge made from maize meal or parlenta. The teachers and all the kids eat together. Please feel free to ask anything should you not understand.
